



# OUR NEXT BROADWAY SEASON SHOW: "THE BAND'S VISIT"

"The Band's Visit" is ultimately a story about human connection and people from different cultures finding common ground. Set in a town off the beaten path, a band of musicians arrives lost, but soon finds support from its residents. In creating hopefulness through small acts like sharing a meal, going roller skating or even waiting for a phone call, the band brings the town to life in unexpected ways.

"The Band's Visit" delivers IOO uninterrupted minutes of fresh, unexpected and unique sounds to the stage. With music and lyrics by David Yazbek, the score is infused with a Middle Eastern flavor that incorporates native instruments, rock and theatrical sounds.

The show stars Janet Dacal ("In the Heights," original Broadway cast) and Israeli actor Sasson Gabay, who starred in the 2007 movie "The Band's Visit," from which the musical is derived.

## RBTL'S PATRON SERVICES

The theater should be an inviting, safe and inclusive space for everyone, and RBTL is committed to providing patrons of all abilities a positive and enjoyable theatre-going experience. To ensure that, there are a variety of accessibility services offered at RBTL's Auditorium Theatre.

For those who are deaf or hearing impaired, FM listening devices are available at every performance, free of charge, to amplify and clarify sound. At most Thursday evening performances of Broadway Season shows and select other performances, ASL interpretation is offered. The interpreters stand on a platform house right of the stage. They spend weeks studying the script in order to accurately interpret what is being said on stage. Also, during most Sunday matinee performances of the Broadway Season, RBTL offers open captioning. This is a scrolling text display on a screen (located on a platform house left of the stage), which is in synchronization with the dialogue and lyrics of the show. Captioning is made possible by the Hearing Loss Association of America (HLAA).

RBTL's services for the blind or visually impaired include audio description during the Sunday matinee Broadway Season performances. A trained describer narrates the visual elements of the show through a personal headset. Abbreviated Braille and large print Playbills are also made available.

While there is no elevator at the Auditorium Theatre, due to the historic limitations of the building, there is wheelchair and transfer seating available on the Orchestra level. Wheelchair and companion seating are located in Orchestra Right and Orchestra Left rows P and Y. Transfer seating is located throughout the Orchestra level in assorted aisle seats. For convenience, storage for mobility devices is also available during the show. For arriving at the Theatre, accessible parking is located to the rear of the building with an accessible entrance on the west side. In addition, accessible restrooms are located off the side lobby, next to Ethan Allen's Rothschild Lounge.

Finally, here are some additional services for patrons: At every performance, child booster seats are available and coat check, which is located in the second floor lobby, is available for a \$1 donation to RBTL's arts education programs. RBTL also keeps a Lost and Found. For those who think they may have left an item at the Auditorium Theatre, you can call our Box Office at 585-222-5000.

# GET TO KNOW THE STARS OF TOMORROW STUDENT PRODUCTION CREW

While the audience is focused on what's happening on stage, it's all with the help of what's going on backstage. RBTL's <u>Stars of Tomorrow</u> is not only giving student performers an opportunity to shine, but it's also giving experience to a student production crew.

"A student crew should get the opportunity to perform their craft in this space as well as the on-stage performers," says Stars of Tomorrow Stage Manager Erin Holt. "Getting to work in a space like RBTL's Auditorium Theatre is a thrill for them. This is the stage that has housed the musicals that they've seen and loved, and to walk on that same stage is a deeply moving experience."

Holt overlooks the IO-person production crew, which includes an Assistant Stage Manager, Lighting Designer, Sound Engineer, Flyperson, Deck Crew, Pit Monitor and Mic Wranglers. It's her job to hire and train the student crew members. Holt's position also entails keeping the rehearsals on schedule and making sure everyone knows where to go and what to do the night of the Stars of Tomorrow Recognition Ceremony and Stars of Tomorrow NYC Bound.



Local students make up the Mic Wranglers. They are constantly moving by putting on and taking off the performers' mics. They are also keeping track of who is wearing which mic so that all 18 mics can be accounted for at the end of the night.

This year, the Assistant Stage Manager wasn't a local high school student, but he used to be. Elijah was a student crew member back in 2017 when he was a senior at Canandaigua Academy. His role includes gathering information during rehearsals, such as what props need to be used. During the show, he's the one who makes sure people find their way around backstage.

Holt says it's important for the students to have this opportunity because it gives them the chance to see their passion in action as a career. "The theatre world seems so fantastical to those who are on the outside, that it's almost hard to believe that it's a job that shares the same burdens and frustrations as every other job. It can cloud even a job that you love. But for 6 days every May, I am surrounded by hundreds of teens who are here simply because they love theatre. It's pure passion, and excitement, and joy that brings tears to my eyes every time. It reminds me of why we do this, why we fell in love with this crazy life."
